Borough of Ship Bottom Regular Meeting Minutes July 23, 2013

The following are the minutes of the regular meeting of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Ship Bottom, which was held on Tuesday, July 23, 2013, in the Municipal Building Council room, located at 1621 Long Beach Blvd., Ship Bottom, NJ.

Mayor Huelsenbeck called the Caucus Meeting to order at 6:33 p.m. and asked the Clerk to take attendance. The following were present:

WHEREAS, as a result of FEMA's review of our current plan, it was noted that an updated plan was required to be developed in accordance with the CRS Planning Steps outlined in Section 510 of the CRS Manual; and

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with that direction, the Floodplain Management Committee held a series of advertised meetings to reevaluate and update the plan; and

WHEREAS, it was noted at this year's meeting that there has been several flood events since the Storm of 1992, including Superstorm Sandy, and the overall plan and current Action Plan have been updated again this year.

**WHEREAS,** Harjinder Bedi, M.D. (hereinafter "Owner") was the owner of Block 55, Lot 4.01 as shown on the Tax Map of the Borough of Ship Bottom (hereinafter "Borough") and commonly known as 1805 Long Beach Boulevard in the Borough of Ship Bottom (hereinafter "property"); and

WHEREAS, the property was the subject of a site plan application before the Ship Bottom Land Use Review Board (hereinafter "Board") seeking preliminary and final major site plan approval together with any required variances to demolish the existing building and construct a two-story mixed use building containing a medical office on the first floor and an accessory apartment on the second floor of the property; and

**WHEREAS,** as a condition of the Board approval, the Owner/Applicant was required to relinquish to the Borough any ownership interest in and to the right-of-way known as Pennsylvania Avenue as set forth in the resolution of memorialization of the Board adopted April 19, 2006, Docket No. 2006: 02 SP\V; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the site plan approval, the Owner/Applicant of the property prepared and recorded a Deed which however incorrectly conveyed to the Borough the entire property as opposed to simply conveying that portion of the property known as Pennsylvania Avenue and which Deed was recorded on June 5, 2006 in Deed Book 13195, Page 0790-0799, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "A"; and

WHEREAS, a Corrective Deed has been prepared to correct the prior Deed from Harjinder Bedi, M.D. dated May 30, 2006, and recorded on June 5, 2006, in Deed Book 13195, Page 0790, which Deed effectively transferred the entire property to the Borough, wherein it was the intention of the Grantor/Owner to deed only the part of the property, commonly known as Pennsylvania Avenue, and described within the Deed on Schedule "A" and which Deed is further made for the purpose of satisfying the conditions of the Board's memorializing resolution adopted on April 19, 2006 under Docket No. 2006: 02SP/V approving a preliminary and final major site plan, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "B"; and

**WHEREAS,** it is the desire of the Mayor and governing body to authorize the execution of the Corrective Deed so as to retain only that portion of the property known as Pennsylvania Avenue.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the governing body of the Borough of Ship Bottom, County of Ocean, State of New Jersey, as follows:

On a motion by Councilman Rossi, seconded by Councilman English and an all in favor vote, all aye, the hearing was closed to the public. On a motion by Councilman Rossi, seconded by Councilman Tallon, Ordinance 2013-09 was adopted as follows:

ORDINANCE 2013-09 AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF SHIP BOTTOM, IN THE COUNTY OF OCEAN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, PROVIDING FOR VARIOUS GENERAL IMPROVEMENTS AND OTHER RELATED EXPENSES IN AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF SHIP BOTTOM AND APPROPRIATING \$250,000 THEREFOR, AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$237,500 IN BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH OF SHIP BOTTOM TO FINANCE THE SAME.

#### **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SHIP BOTTOM, IN THE COUNTY OF OCEAN, NEW JERSEY** (not less than twothirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring), **AS FOLLOWS:**

<u>Section 1</u>. The several improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby authorized to be undertaken by the Borough of Ship Bottom, in the County of Ocean, New Jersey (the "Borough") as general improvements. For the several improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof, there are hereby appropriated the respective sums of money therein stated as the appropriations made for each improvement or purpose, such sums amounting in the aggregate to \$250,000 including the sum of \$12,5000 as the several down payments required by the Local Bond Law. The down payments have been made available by virtue of provision for down payment or for capital improvement purposes in one or more previously adopted budgets.

<u>Section 2</u>. In order to finance the cost of the several improvements or purposes not covered by application of the down payment or otherwise provided for hereunder, negotiable bonds or notes are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$237,500 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of the bonds or notes, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

Section 3. (a) The several improvements hereby authorized and the several purposes for which the bonds or notes are to be issued, the estimated cost of each improvement and the appropriation therefore, the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for each improvement and the period of usefulness of each improvement are as follows:

(1) <u>Purpose</u>: Reconstruction and alterations to Borough Hall including all work and materials necessary therefore and including all else necessary therefor or incidental thereto.

Appropriation and Estimated Cost:	\$150,000.
Maximum Amount of Bonds or Notes:	\$142,500.
Period or Average Period of Usefulness:	15 years
Amount of Down Payment:	\$ 7,500.

(2) <u>Purpose</u>: Reconstruction of and improvements to Borough street-end bulkheads, walkways and public parks and related expenses, and including all work and materials necessary therefor or incidental thereto.

Appropriation and Estimated Cost:	\$100,000.
Maximum Amount of Bonds or Notes:	\$ 95,000.
Period or Average Period of Usefulness:	10 years
Amount of Down Payment:	\$ 5,000.

(b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for the several improvements or purposes is as stated in Section 2 hereof.

(c) The estimated cost of the several improvements or purposes is equal to the amount of the appropriation herein made therefor.

All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times Section 4. as may be determined by the chief financial officer; provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this bond ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-8.1. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time, at not less than par and accrued interest, at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this bond ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

<u>Section 5</u>. The capital budget or temporary capital budget (as applicable) of the Borough is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this bond ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. In the event of any such inconsistency and amendment, the resolution in the form promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget or amended temporary capital budget (as applicable) and capital program as approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services is on file with the Borough Clerk and is available there for public inspection.

**Section 6.** The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

(a) The several improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not current expenses. They are improvements or purposes the Borough may lawfully undertake as general improvements, and no part of the costs thereof have been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefitted thereby.

(b) The average period of usefulness of the several improvements or purposes, computed on the basis of the respective amounts or obligations authorized for each improvement or purpose and the reasonable life thereof within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, is 13.0 years.

(c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the Borough as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$237,500, and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by that Law.

(d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$20,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for the several improvements or purposes.

(e) The Borough reasonably expects to commence the acquisition and/or construction of the several improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof, and to advance all or a portion of the costs in respect thereof, prior to the issuance of bonds or notes hereunder. To the extent such costs are advanced, the Borough further reasonably expects to reimburse such expenditures from the proceeds of the bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance, in an aggregate amount not to exceed the amount of bonds or notes authorized in Section 2 hereof.

Section 7. Any grant moneys received for the purposes described in Section 3 hereof shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvements or to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to this bond ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized hereunder shall be reduced to the extent that such funds are so used.

Section 8. The full faith and credit of the Borough is hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within

the Borough for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

Section 9. The Borough hereby covenants to take any action necessary or refrain from taking such action in order to preserve the tax-exempt status of the bonds and notes authorized hereunder as is or may be required under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and the regulations promulgated thereunder (the "Code"), including compliance with the Code with regard to the use, expenditure, investment, timely reporting and rebate of investment earnings as may be required thereunder.

Section 10. After passage upon first reading of this bond ordinance, the Borough Clerk is hereby directed to publish the full text of the bond ordinance, together with the notice set forth below entitled: "NOTICE OF PENDING BOND ORDINANCE" (with appropriate completions, insertions and corrections), at least once in a newspaper qualified under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-19, at least seven days prior to the date set for public hearing and further consideration for final passage (which date shall be at least ten days after introduction and first reading). The Borough Clerk is further directed to comply with all provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-17(b) regarding postings, publications and the provision of copies of this bond ordinance.

Section 11. After final adoption of this bond ordinance by the Borough Council, the Borough Clerk is hereby directed to publish the full text or summary of this bond ordinance, as finally adopted, together with the notice set forth below entitled: "NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF BOND ORDINANCE" (with appropriate completions, insertions and corrections), at least once in a newspaper qualified under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-19.

Section 12. To the extent that any previous ordinance or resolution is inconsistent herewith or contradictory hereto, said ordinance or resolution is hereby repealed or amended to the extent necessary to make it consistent herewith.

Section 13. This bond ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

## Revenue and Finance: Councilman David Hartman

The taxes collected for July, month to date is \$93,641.15, of that \$88,173.78 are for 2013 and \$3,658.85 are for 2012. Miscellaneous revenues for July are municipal court

fines & costs - \$8,058.00, tower lease rental - \$3,025.00 and a vendor license - \$1,000.00.

The FEMA funds are as follows: The federal obligations are at 90% and is currently at \$372,301.34. The funds that we have received so far are: beach birm, protective measures at \$69,471.75, street end barricades at \$4,541.33, police & water department at \$66,195.71 and trailers at \$2,560.88, for a total of \$142,769.67. The amount still being processed is \$38,688.94, of which \$512.18 is for trailers and \$38,176.76 is for dune fencing and parks and recreation facilities.

# Public Safety: Councilman Tom Tallon

The public safety report for July 2013 is as follows: There were 5,420 patrol vehicle miles. There were 777 reported activities. The majority of the activity was for traffic stops. There were 333 traffic stops. There were six DWI's.

Several times a year Chief Sharkey receives letters from citizens thanking individual officers for a job well done. These letters are placed in personnel files and are not brought to the public's attention. Once in a while the Chief receives a letter thanking an officer for an exceptional job well done. I am going to read such a letter the Chief received from Stafford Township's Chief of Police and I would ask that it be spread upon the minutes. It is as follows:

## June 10, 2013

Dear Chief Sharkey,

Our Departments Drug Enforcement Unit several years ago had received information with regard to an individual who was believed to be involved with a narcotics trafficking network which found its way into our community. Countless hours of man power was dedicated to building an investigation with the intent of ending this individual's enterprise of drug corruption. As the investigation grew, so did our need for assistance. It was at this time our Drug Unit requested the assistance of your department's Detective Michael Nash in assisting with our investigation which was now known as "OPERATION KING PIN".

Detective Nash's time, vigilance, observations and documentation during the surveillance assignment helped establish the probable cause for the successful apprehension of Enzo Pena who was charged with over twelve criminal charges ranging from terroristic threats, employing juveniles for the commission of a crime, possession of fire arms with narcotics, possession and distribution of narcotics and ultimately the difficult task of charging the leader of a narcotics network, a first degree offense.

Chief Sharkey, I am writing to you to express our appreciation toward Detective Nash for his persistence, notable teamwork and his professionalism. Without his efforts put forth in this assignment, Pena would have continued in this ongoing course of criminal conduct and would have continued hurting countless unknown juveniles by providing the gateway to illegal behavior and a criminal lifestyle.

Again, thank you, and Detective Nash for helping us make our community a healthier and safer place to live and to enjoy.

Concerts are on Thursday nights from 7-9. The band, Mushmouth, was rained out last week. This week, we have the "Verdict', August 1-Eleven Eleven, August 8-Sir Rod, August 15-Bridesmaids and August 22-Jimmy and the Parrots.

Water and Sewer: Councilman Richard Sinopoli

During the month of June, we pumped 11,120,000 gallons of water. The plant and wells were inspected daily. They helped with the water meter reads and repairs. Repairs were made to water & sewer systems as needed. The contractor came in and paved the 6 open water/sewer trenches.

Public Property and Community Affairs: Dr. Robert Gleason

<u>Code Enforcement:</u> 62 verbal warnings issued, unleashed dogs-5, illegal signs-18, trash-29, trailer on street-4, weeds-3 and construction materials on street-3. There were 19 written warnings all for weeds. There were also 13 summons' for trash and 1 summons for trailer on street. The total for cardboard this year is 90,088 pounds and the total for the beach is 1,380 pounds. Majority is from the commercial business'. Zoning Department: 4 resale inspections and 15 zoning permits were issued. <u>Construction Department:</u> There were 38 permits processed and 9 permit updates, for a total of 47. The type of work was 39 alterations/renovations, 1 addition/rehab, 3 new buildings and 4 demolitions. The total revenue is \$11,186.00. <u>Buildings and Grounds:</u> Bob Rossi and public works are working on refurbishing the borough hall and hopefully we will begin getting back in the building within 3-6 weeks.
